



Atlantic International Youth Arts
Festival (AIYAF) is a global youth
arts initiative organized by the
Canadian Network for Imagination
and Creativity (CNIC) and the
National Cultural and Creative
Association of Canada (NCCAC). The
festival aims to establish a long-term
international platform dedicated to
young artists worldwide.

The CNIC is composed of leading art and creativity educators from Canadian universities. It is active in global arts education, creative practice, and international collaboration, with a focus on empowering the next generation through art and creativity while building a cross—cultural arts education network.

The NCCAC is committed to bringing together professionals with expertise in culture, arts, and education within a globalized context, leveraging strengths in cross—cultural understanding and creative expression. Through the planning and implementation of multidimensional and multimedia cultural and artistic projects—both online and offline—it actively promotes cross—cultural learning and exchange.

Festival Mission

The festival invites young people worldwide to participate, offering a professional and international platform that highlights the unique value of art and creativity in the Al era. Through competitions, international collaborations, youth exchanges, exhibitions, workshops, and masterclasses, participants can interact with leading artists and scholars and embark on a meaningful journey of artistic exploration.

A core component of the festival is the annual Global Youth Visual Creativity Competition, which promotes youth creativity worldwide and fosters artistic intelligence for the "empathy era."

Each year, internationally active artists, scholars, and professors serve as rotating chairs, assembling a panel of top experts to select the year's outstanding works. Winners receive signed certificates, recommendation letters, and artistic scholarships.

Participants also gain access to international masterclasses, lectures, and workshops, and may have their works featured in the festival's annual publication and international exhibitions.



Festival Permanent Programs:

International Youth Visual Arts Competition

A global call for entries with clear categories, rigorous judging, and authoritative awards, aiming to discover and nurture the artistic potential of young people worldwide.


International Youth Art Exhibition

Selected works will be displayed in major Canadian art museums. Participants will receive official certificates and opportunities for academic recommendation and media exposure.

International Masterclasses & Lectures

Led by renowned international artists, these sessions—offered both online and in-person—focus on themes such as creative expression, artistic language, and cross—media experimentation.





Age Groups

Children's Group: Born on or after January 1, 2011

Junior Group: Born between January 1, 2007 and December 31, 2010 Youth Group: Born between January 1, 1997 and December 31, 2006


Art Categories

Painting: Includes oil painting, tempera, acrylic, sketching, colored pencil, comic art, watercolor, ink painting, printmaking, and mixed media (collage, paper art, and other combined materials).

Digital Art: Includes digital painting (created on tablets or computers), 3D modeling and animation (3D models, character design, short animated films, etc.).

Traditional Arts: Traditional folk and regional arts.



Entry Guidelines

All submitted works must meet the following requirements:

- Entries must be original works created by the artist, with the longest side not exceeding 1.8m.
- Each work must be labeled with the participant's age group and art category; there are no restrictions on subject matter.
- The copyright of each work must be fully owned by the participant.
- Any works involving cultural appropriation, hate, or discriminatory content will not be accepted.
- An independent jury will select finalists based on submitted images and artist statements. During final judging, jurors will only have access to the artwork image, dimensions, and statement (no identifying information).
- Award-winning works and selected exhibition pieces will be announced separately.



Judging Criteria

Creative Expression (30%)

- Originality and uniqueness of concept and visual style.
- Depth and creativity of theme and content.
- Authenticity, avoiding imitation or plagiarism.

Artistic Quality (30%)

- Visual appeal: color, lighting, and composition.
- Detail and refinement of elements.
- Consistency and coherence of overall style.


Technical Skills (20%)

- Proficiency with tools, media, digital software, or Al tools.
- Innovative use of techniques.
- Resolution and clarity (for static works) or smoothness (for animations).

Emotional Impact (20%)

- Ability to evoke emotional response (e.g., inspiration, joy, reflection).
- Storytelling through visuals or narrative.
- Depth of meaning beyond surface aesthetics.






Entry Requirements

- Each work must be submitted individually through the festival's official website, along with a completed entry form.
- Entry fee: CAD \$60/piece (including HST).
- Payment and submission can be completed directly at www.visualartfest.com or through an official partner organization in your region.
- Only digital photos are accepted for judging. Each work must include 3—5 images (full view, close-up details, and scale reference).
- Accepted file formats: JPG, PDF, TIFF, CR2; file size 2-20 MB, resolution at least 300 dpi.

Participant Benefits

- Each participant will receive an official festival entry certificate.
- All participants may join the online masterclasses.
- Winners will receive professional feedback from the jury.
- Winners may be recommended for publication in Canadian art journals and have the opportunity to apply for inclusion in the international AIYAF exhibition.
- Participants may request a festival recommendation letter to support art school applications, professional programs, or artistic credentials.

Copyright & Originality Statement: All participants must register with their real name and valid contact information. If anonymity or a pen name is required for artistic reasons, prior approval from the committee is necessary. Collaborative works must list all creators, and any awards will be issued to the work as a whole. If the work includes tribute, adaptation, or use of others' materials, the original sources and creators must be clearly credited in the artist statement. Copyright remains with the artist, but the organizers may use images and related materials for festival promotion, exhibitions, publications, and non-profit communications, without commercial use.



In late January 2026, renowned artists will host online masterclasses, and interactive lectures open to all participants.

The sessions will offer feedback on selected works and discuss global art trends, education, and the art market, providing a platform for young artists and educators to learn and connect.

Art Creation Masterclasses (3 sessions)

Jury artists will review each winning and exhibited work, providing detailed analysis, highlighting strengths, and offering professional advice for improvement.




A session focusing on art education programs, trends, and study-abroad opportunities in Europe and North America, featuring university art faculty and education consultants, with interactive Q&A.

Cross-Cultural Exploration Session (1 session)

Young artists from leading art institutions worldwide will share their study experiences and artistic journeys, offering insights into cutting-edge art education and global art trends.







Exhibition Information

The festival exhibitions will be held at university art galleries, as well as national and provincial art museums and cultural centers.


Exhibition Date: May 2026

During the exhibition period, activities such as art seminars, welcome receptions, and press conferences will be arranged. All details are subject to change based on actual circumstances.

Exhibition Requirements

- An independent jury will select works for the award exhibition based on submitted images and artist statements.
- Works must be insurable and transportable for display and potential sale during the exhibition.
- A 35% commission will be charged on artworks sold or consigned during the festival exhibition. Final prices will be agreed upon by both parties.
- Framed dimensions must not exceed 180 cm (H) x 150 cm (W).
- Works must be securely framed or stretched, ready for installation, and equipped with a proper hanging system. Works that cannot be safely installed may be disqualified.
- Any unconventional display methods must be communicated in advance to ensure proper installation.
- The organizers reserve the right to withdraw works that pose health or safety risks to the public, volunteers, or staff, or that violate occupational health and safety guidelines.






Exhibitor Benefits

- All exhibitors will receive an official exhibition certificate, a recommendation letter signed by the Art Committee, and have the opportunity to be featured in the CNIC academic journal special issue and online exhibitions.
- For works selected for the annual exhibition (excluding Grand Jury Prize winners), an **exhibition fee of CAD 500/piece** is required. This covers curation, local transportation in Canada, installation, and insurance.
- For participants from Mainland China, artworks must be mailed to a designated location in China, after which the committee will arrange bulk sea shipment.

Release Statement

- Partner Organizations: Media outlets, cultural institutions, museums, art galleries, professional art organizations, and university associations in China, Canada, and worldwide.
- All finalists agree that the organizing committee may use their artworks, portraits, and related exhibition information in print and digital media for event promotion, publicity, and display on the official website.




Dr. Danielle Hogan Ph.D., Art Researcher & Artist (Canada)


